Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form).

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the Charity Trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have appropriate gifts and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and is inducted by Presbytery.

On 8 May 2013 the Rev G McGeoch was inducted to the charge of Broughton St Mary's by the Presbytery of Edinburgh and, accordingly, the Rev. P Bluett's appointment as Interim Moderator came to an end. The charge had been vacant since the demission of Rev J Hood on 29 May 2012. There were no other appointments or resignations of trustees during the year.

Organisational structure

As a congregation with the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) the Kirk Session, as well as being responsible for the spiritual affairs within the Church, also has responsibility for its property and financial affairs. The Kirk Session which meets five times a year, has appointed a property and finance team that reports directly to the Kirk Session.

Objectives and activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish in Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond. The Church of Scotland is fully committed to working with people of all faiths and no faith.

Broughton St. Mary's provides regular Sunday **worship** at 10.30am every week, and an alternative way of worshipping using a Labyrinth at times when necessary or desired by the congregation, parish or presbytery. A Sunday Club for children of all ages meets every Sunday morning during the latter part of worship and a crèche is also available for babies and young children.

The congregation holds various events through the year to engage the wider community of the parish in the work of the Church including coffee mornings and Christmas and spring fairs. The Church has also hosted services for its local primary school for the past eight years. We held a community service and meal with invitations sent to the Muslim Community via Annadale Mosque. A service for Remembrance and Healing has been held for the bereaved. These services allow us to connect with more local people and show how serious we are in our efforts to accept, care for and include the many different communities that exist within our parish.

Social events are also held for the congregation to welcome new worshippers and create a sense of **fellowship** within the Church itself. These include celebration lunches or meals, garden parties, Christmas parties and congregational outings. The Sunday Club also holds an annual outing for all the children and their families. During the Summer we held barbeques in the church garden which were enjoyed by the congregation, guests from the parish and users of the premises.

In addition to the activities the Church organises to assist in reaching its aims and objectives, there are other bodies that use our premises and hold activities which benefit and enrich the life and profile of the Church. These include the Wednesday Club (a group of carpet bowlers and scrabble players), the Scottish Country Dance Club, the Art Club, the Brownie Guides, the Rainbow Guides and the

Medau Society. The Beavers, Cubs and Scouts of the 11th Edinburgh North East Group are sponsored by the Kirk Session and are affiliated to the Church and on occasion hold meetings in our premises. There is also a Garden Team that tends the church garden which enhances our surroundings and brings pleasure to users and visitors to the premises.

During the past year

As part of our **service** to others the following charitable bodies have used the church's premises during the year; Alopecia Scotland, Feed Edinburgh, Child Survival in Malawi, Waverley Care, No Strings Attached Community Wind Band, Edinburgh Society of Organists, Scotlish Chamber Orchestra and Chorus, Dunedin Concerts Trust Ltd, The Church of Scotland World Mission Council. Various individuals from the community have used the premises to hold family celebrations. The New Town and Broughton Community Council has held its meetings in our premises. Heriothill Nursery has held its Christmas concert and parties in our premises. The production team from The Broughton Spurtle a community newsletter uses our premises for meetings.

A major user of the premises is the City of Edinburgh Council (Bellevue Project) which caters for adults from the local area with learning difficulties. Members of the congregation also worked with the staff and service users of the council's Bellevue Project in holding a Coffee Morning in aid of Macmillan Cancer Support.

Other regular users of the premises are Yoga classes, Qigong, Daoist Yoga and Meditation Classes. The Broughton Health Clinic, a Physiotherapy service operates from the premises during the week.

Special occasions also bring other events to the annual life cycle of Broughton St Mary's. We offer a summertime reflective **worship** service in July and a Watchnight Service at 11.00 pm on Holy Saturday. On Easter Sunday morning we have two services, the first in the garden and the second a family celebration of Holy Communion, with breakfast in between. Christmas also offers different worship opportunities. A Watchnight Service is held at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve and a 10.30am family service takes place on Christmas Day after which the sacrament of Holy Communion is celebrated. The Central Branch of the Royal British Legion, the 11th Edinburgh North East Scout Group and pupils from Drummond Community High School participated in our annual Remembrance Day service in November. The Church marked World Aids Day and the facade of the church building was floodlit in red lighting to highlight our commitment to support those affected by HIV and AIDS.

Other groups that exist to promote **discipleship** in Broughton St Mary's and enable us in our aims to allow people to grow in their faith are our Learning and Growth discussion groups which cover various themes and also run throughout the period of Lent. Monthly Bible Study meetings are held throughout the year. During the year the Church has held "Messy Church" which provides a different church experience for children of all ages up to 12 years together with their parents/carers. We have continued to develop this opportunity for **evangelism** to children and adults who do not attend church at other times.

Rev Graham McGeoch became the minister of Broughton St Mary's on 8 May 2013. From 12 January 2013 to 8 May 2013 worship was conducted by the locum minister, Rev Ian Scott. Rev Peter Bluett acted as Interim Moderator of the Kirk Session until Mr McGeoch's induction.

Achievements and performance

This past year has seen a continuing growth in our groups and projects using the rooms and facilities developed by the first phase of work on the lower ground floor of our building.

Discipleship: Our Lent Discussion Groups ran twice a week throughout Lent met in the new rooms. A number of those who met wanted to continue to meet beyond Lent as a result a regular Bible Study meeting has been introduced. The number of people associated with our congregation continues to rise. This is also shown in new and more worshippers on Sunday mornings. Members of the congregation are taking a greater part in the conduct of public worship through reading the bible, leading prayers and all age teaching.

Our Christmas worship once again attracted substantial numbers from our congregation and parish to the Church at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve and 10.30am on Christmas Day. We collected foodstuffs which were donated to the Rock Trust to bring cheer to homeless young people. Our acts of **evangelism** and charity continued in the donation of presents for the children of prisoners at HM Prison Edinburgh. Our Christmas offerings were donated to Waverley Care a charity which works with those affected by HIV/AIDS. We have contributed to the work of the North Edinburgh Foodbank through the donation of foodstuffs.

The Sunday Club continues to benefit from having a greater number of children in attendance and a rota of Sunday Club leaders who participate fully in our children's ministry but also are enabled to attend worship regularly.

The congregation looks forward to continuing to use its building in **service** to the community and developing our congregational life as we strive to serve our people and parish, working together with our neighbours in other churches and faith communities.

Financial review

Unrestricted funds

The position of the General Fund is summarised in the table below. The letting of our newly refurbished rooms continues to be a welcome source of revenue and this has increased strongly in the last year.

In contrast to recent prior years, none of the income from letting rooms was accounted for in the Refurbishment Appeal Fund in 2013 (2012: £4,925). This reflects the fact that the financial position of the General Fund was considered to be weaker than in previous years.

The other unrestricted funds are the Manse Fund and the Legacy Fund. The Manse Fund represents the capital value of the manse and garage. There were no transactions in the Manse Fund in 2013. One legacy was received in 2013 amounting to £500 and this was accounted for in the Legacy Fund (2012: £2,000).

Refurbishment appeal

The refurbishment of the lower ground floor, including the addition of the Garden Room, was completed in 2009. The final loan repayment to the General Trustees was made during 2013 and we are no longer incurring any interest expense. As detailed in appendix 3, the final cost of the project was £1,593,653.

The Trustees continue to be grateful for all grants and donations towards the refurbishment appeal. Approximately £18,300 of income was received in 2013 (2012: £30,000).

Most of the income and expenses relating to the refurbishment were routed through a special capital account with the Church of Scotland General Trustees. For information purposes, a combined statement of the transactions incurred by the congregation and the General Trustees, since the launch of the refurbishment appeal is presented in Appendix 3. This shows that the cumulative shortfall of income to expenditure (after taking account of accrued Gift Aid) now stands at £1,428 (2012: £19,661).

Since 2010, deposits held in other funds have been made available to the Appeal Fund in order to reduce the loan balance (and thereby our interest expense). This was accounted for as a loan between funds. Much of this notional loan was repaid during 2012 and 2013 and, by the end of 2013, the balance had fallen to £2,280. Until the end of 2012 notional interest was charged at 0.25% above the interest rate on the COSIT Deposit Fund. This amounted to £430 in 2012. Given the diminishing size of the sums involved and the lack of income in the Appeal Fund, it is not intention of the Trustees to account for further interest and no interest was accrued during 2013.

The Church building itself is vested in the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland and does not appear on our balance sheet.

Fabric fund

For the third year running, Fabric Fund expenditure has been significant at £9,826 (2012: £19,406 and 2011: £32,892). In 2013 this included work on the garden wall at the church and new rear windows in the manse.

In the period 2011 to 2013 the funds available for Fabric purposes have fallen significantly (from £20,184 to £4,485).

Since 2011, the Fabric Fund has been accounted for as a restricted fund as the Fund's income is exclusively from endowment income or donations which have been specified as being for fabric purposes.

Other restricted funds

The Sunday Club Fund benefited from a number of donations during 2013 including those made for tea and coffee after Sunday services during December which amounted to £141. Transactions for the Sunday Club Fund, and the other restricted funds, are summarised at note 15 of the accounts.

Investments and endowment funds

This year, the amount of investment income which was transferred from endowment funds into the various restricted and unrestricted funds was £5,151 (2012: £5,247). The principal recipient of these transfers is the Fabric Fund.

Additionally, investment gains of £16,165 (2012: £3,200) have been recognised in the General and Endowment Funds. Our main investment continues to be the Growth Fund of the Church of Scotland Investors Trust the unit price of which has increased from £3.53 to £4.13 over the year (and has thus almost regained the 31 December 2007 price of £4.20).

At the end of November, all of the COSIT Deposit units held in Endowment funds, some £13,674, were switched into COSIT Growth units. This change was made in response to the continuing falling interest rate and the fact that Endowment Fund investments are made for the long-term.

Reserves policy

The unrestricted reserves at the end of the financial year amount to £354,400 (2012: £349,500) of which £300,000, representing the value of our properties, has been designated as the Manse Fund.

It would be the normal practice of the Trustees to hold unrestricted reserves of approximately four months expenditure including designated funds. However, the trustees deem it to be prudent to hold a larger figure at present as it is likely that our financial position will remain under strain in the coming years as we seek to find new ways to make use of our building and enhance our role in the local community. Additionally, other matters provide financial uncertainty such as uncertainty over how long the Church's exemption from water and sewage charges will continue and the current rental agreement with Vodafone, which yields significant income, is due to expire in 2017.

Excluding the Refurbishment Fund (which is in deficit), the Church held £18,700 (2012: £21,800) of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in note 15.

The endowment revenue reserve of £28,800, (2012: £17,100) cannot be spent as they arise from the gain on the revaluation to market value of the investments in the endowment capital funds.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair value of the state of affairs of the charity and its financial activities for the period. In preparing these financial statements the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in existence.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. They are also responsible for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Edinburgh: Broughton St. Mary's Parish Church (Church of Scotland)

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2013 which are set out on pages 9 to 23.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1)(a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations do not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1)(c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiners statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts are set out below.

The charity has adopted the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued February 2005).

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost convention, modified to reflect the inclusion of investments and heritable property at market value, and in accordance with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, the Regulations anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007 and by the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (2005).

Funds

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds held subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the whole of the fund is permanently maintained for the benefit of the charity as a capital fund, but the income therefrom is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming resources

All donations and gifts, other than special collections for other bodies with no connection to the charity, are included within incoming resources under either restricted or unrestricted funds according to the terms under which the donation is made when the amount can be quantified with reasonable certainty. Material donations and gifts in kind are brought into these accounts at market value to the charity.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as the liability is incurred.

Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

The charity has a right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets.

The heritable fixed assets comprise:

<u>Vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees</u> Church: 12 Bellevue Crescent, Edinburgh EH3 6NE

Owned by the charity

Manse: 103 East Claremont Street, Edinburgh EH7 4JA Lock up Garage: 5c Inverleith Place, Edinburgh EH3 5QJ

The manse and lock up garage are stated at market valuations placed on them by the trustees. Expenditure incurred on repair and maintenance of the heritable fixed assets is charged as resources expended in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the liability arises. Normal expenditure is charged to the General Fund while extraordinary repairs and improvement of fabric, fittings and equipment is met from the Fabric Fund.

All tangible fixed assets having a value to the charity of greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, over their estimated useful lives.

Fixtures, fittings and office equipment 10 years Musical instruments 20 years

No depreciation has been charged against heritable property as the trustees consider that any depreciation would not be material as the asset has a very long useful life.

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on the disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Broughton St. Mary's Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is not therefore subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

Short term deposits

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the cost of all ministers' stipends and employers' contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £25,253 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years) £31,035.

7. Trustees remuneration and related party transactions

The manse was occupied by Rev. G McGeoch from 1 May 2013. During the year, Council Tax of £1,527 was paid in respect of that period of occupation. The Minister was reimbursed for £342 of travel expenses and £1,690 in respect of removal costs and disturbance allowances. In addition, sums were collected from the congregation for the benefit of the Minister and the Interim Moderator (these are disclosed at note 16 below). No other trustee received any remuneration or reimbursement of expenses during the year.

The income from the Lawrence S. Miller Memorial is to be used, at the discretion of the Kirk Session, for the purpose of providing additional financial support to the minister of the congregation.

The income from the following endowments is to be used for benevolent purposes by way of grants and financial assistance to members of the congregation and others:

Congregation Benevolent Legacies Braidwood Beguest

James Kirkhope Bequest Broughton Lady Visitors Fund

Ann Padon Bequest Dorcas Society Fund

The income from the following endowments is to be used for mission and worship purposes in the congregation and in the wider mission work of the Church.

Canongate Fund Miss Jack Legacy

Rutherford Bequest

The income from the 17 individual bequests making up the Missionary Society Fund is to be used for the work of the Church world-wide. This is achieved by using the income as part of the congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution to the Church of Scotland.

The income from the Sutherland Bequest is to be used for youth work in the congregation.

The income from the Callendar Bequest is to be used to provide benefits such as summer outings and Christmas parties for the senior citizens in the congregation.

The income from the Dr. G.S. Gunn Bequest is to be used to provide bibles to mark special occasions in the life of individuals in the congregation.

The income from the Neill & Davidson Bequests is to be used to provide flowers for the Church sanctuary.

15. Movement in funds (continued)

The income from the J. Sommerville Bequest for Special Calls is to be used to meet at the discretion of the Kirk Session, special calls made on the resources of the congregation.

The income from the Lawrence S. Miller Memorial (Sunday Club) is to be used to provide funds to support the work of the Sunday Club (Sunday School) of the congregation.

(<u>Note</u>: All of the income from the above endowments is transferred annually to the appropriate fund which is specified for the endowment.)

Purposes of restricted funds

Ministerial Support Fund: This is a fund established to provide, at the discretion of the Kirk Session, additional financial support to the minister.

Organ Maintenance Fund: This is a fund established to provide funds to meet the costs of maintaining the organ and other musical instruments used in the conduct of worship.

Flower Fund: This is a fund to be used to provide flowers in the Church premises and for other approved purposes.

Refurbishment Fund: The congregation launched an appeal to raise £1.7 million to carry out a major refurbishment of the Church building in Bellevue Crescent. All the income which is raised is transferred to the Church of Scotland General Trustee Account 560100082 (see Appendix 1). The funds in this account are designated to meet the costs of carrying out the refurbishment.

Benevolent Fund: This is a fund established to provide grants and financial assistance to members of the congregation and others in need.

Mission & Worship Fund: This is a fund established to provide materials to assist the minister in the conduct of worship and to promote the mission statement of the congregation both in the parish and in the wider work of the Church.

Youth Fund: This is a fund which provides resources promoting the work of youth projects associated with the congregation.

Senior Citizens Fund: This is a fund which is used towards meeting the costs of projects and functions for the senior citizens in the congregation.

Bible Presentation Fund: This is a fund used to meet the costs of bibles purchased for presentation purposes.

Special Calls Fund: This is a fund established to meet the costs of special calls made on members and resources of the congregation.

Youth & Choral Fund: This is a fund established from the proceeds of the McBain Legacy to meet the cost of music resources for the Church choir and for meeting the cost of youth projects. There is no fixed split of how the income should be allocated between youth and choral projects.

15. Movement in funds (continued)

Adult Education Fund: This fund is to be used towards meeting the cost of organising and members attending Christian education events.

Sunday Club Fund: This fund is used for the provision of resources to enable the Sunday Club to meet the objectives that have been set by the Kirk Session.

Minute for Mission Fund: This fund is to support the further education of a former pupil of Cannonmills school within the parish.

Music Fund: This fund was established in 2010 originally to fund the costs of a new piano and it has been agreed with the relevant donor that surplus funds should be applied for Music purposes.

Fabric Fund: This fund is designated to meet the costs of extraordinary repairs and improvement of fabric, fittings and equipment used in the congregational properties. From 2011 onwards, this fund has been regarded as a restricted fund rather than a designated fund as the fund's income is substantially all from donations or endowment income which are specified as being for fabric purposes.

Messy Church Fund: This fund was established in 2011 to run activities for young children.

20s & 30s Fund: This fund was established in 2011 to contribute to the costs of running events for members of our worshipping community in their 20s and 30s.

Purposes of unrestricted funds

Manse Fund: This fund is a designated fund and represents the capital value of the manse and garage.

Legacy Fund: The legacy fund represents unrestricted legacies. For the purposes of identification such legacies are accounted for separately from other unrestricted funds. No specific purpose has been designated by the Trustees.
